## LatinSummer

*Each day, several “Family Discussion Questions” will be sent home with LatinSummer participants. These questions will help to keep parents informed of what the students are learning, and will help to stimulate family discussion about these topics.*

### Questions for Wednesday, July 29, 2009

#### Latin Class: Topic – Emotions

1. What are emotions, and how are they, literally, “motions of the mind”, or *motus animi*?
2. How is the poetry of Catullus relevant to our modern day experiences?
3. Tell your parents what emotions you experienced today, using the Latin names.

#### Greek Class: Topic – Animals

1. What are some of the Greek words for the animals?
2. Explain to your family the connection between the Greek words “tauros” and “tragos” and English words that come from them.
3. Show your family some of the Greek letters that you have been learning by writing them down.

#### Roman Culture: Topic – Roman Education

1. Show your family the tablet with your name on it and write their names using the ancient Roman alphabet.
2. What was the hardest part of being a Roman student?
3. Do you like the Roman method of education? Would you want to go to school in ancient Rome?

#### Art and Mythology: Topic – The Metamorphoses & Pillars

1. Describe the difference between Doric, Ionic, and Corinthian columns
2. Tell your favorite metamorphosis myth and explain why you like it.
3. What is the moral in *Daedalus and Icarus* and how does the story illustrate this lesson?
4. \*BONUS!\* Read *Baucis and Philemon* and *Midas* and discuss the different consequences of generosity vs. greed.

#### Activities: Topic – Mythology through the Arts: Mars

1. What is Mars the god of? What are words that come to mind when you think of Mars? Why do these words come to mind?
2. How did the Holst movement represent Mars? What impressions did you have about Mars after listening to the music?
3. Show your parents your mosaic. How are mosaics made? What are the different parts of a mosaic? What did you choose to depict on your mosaic, and why?

### Questions for Wednesday, July 29, 2009

#### Grades 1 & 2

**\*If you are in Ms. Kriva’s class, please bring a bedsheet and a picture of yourself tomorrow.**

**\*If you are in Ms. Henrich’s class, please bring a stuffed animal and beach towel tomorrow.**

*Ms. Davis-Foxworth’s’ class:*

1. Explain to your family the Latin words for the family, and then ask them to help you think of English words that come from the Latin.
2. How do you think a Roman family might have been different from your family? How do you think a Roman family would be the same as your family?
3. Tell your family about how you were an archeologist today. What was hard about being an archeologist? Do you think you would want to be an archeologist? Why or why not?

*Ms. Henrich’s class:*

1. Draw a picture of your classroom and label the items in Latin.
2. Which rooms of the Roman house are similar to rooms we have today? Which are different?
3. Based on what you learned about Roman houses, would you want to live in one? Why or why not?

*Ms. Kriva’s class:*

1. Describe five items in your house by saying their color in Latin.
2. Ask your family what their family animal is and tell them its Latin name. How many of the Latin names are similar to their names in English?
3. Play I-Spy with your family using the Latin words for the colors.
